Author of Elwell Good Roads Law.

As President of the City Planning Commission 1921-25, he advocated the present Zoning Law which protects the home owner from the encroachment of factories, stores, and apartments.

Mr. Elwell insists that every dollar spent in the public service bring 100% returns in goods or service.

Mr. Elwell suffered a stroke six years ago on his return from a waterways meeting in St. Louis which made him a semi-invalid. However, his condition did not become critical antil several weeks ago.

Mr. Elwell's political career started in 1899 with his election as a representative in the Minnesota Legislative. In 1801 the voters elevated alm to the State Senate and it was during his term there that he drafted he law bearing his name. The act provides for assessment and acquisition of property for public improvements and has been used as model egislation by many other states.

Supported Larger U. Campus.

Through his leadership of the lood Roads association much of the early highway legislation in the state was enacted.


Mr. Elwell was born in St. Anhony, the oldest of eight children, attended school at Cottage Grove and later Carleton college.


